Compost bins;


Playground improvement-


Library News


Celebrating International Women's Day 2023

NWCC Teenage Book Group's




The NWCC Teenage Book Group for S4-S6 pupils meet at lunchtimes on the last Tuesday of the month in the school library where we have a lively chat about what we thought of the book, the themes within them and then score the book out of 10.

This year so far, the group have read three stories of teenagers caught in very challenging situations, including one that had elements of a graphic novel. Read Between the Lies by Malcolm Duffy and Punching the Air by Ibi Zoboi and Yusef Salaam were given scores of 5/10 and 7/10, respectively. Their favourite was Eight Pieces of Silva by Patrice Lawrence with a whopping 8/10. Silva disappears, and with the parents away on holiday, it's up to younger sister Becks to find her through clues littered in Silva's bedroom. This book was full of conflict, plot twists and betrayals - members felt that Lawrence really captured the teenage voice of today.

The book group have finished their meetings for this academic year due to forthcoming exams, but plan to meet again in September 2023.




Girls Cycle Group



In February P3, P4 and P4/5 visited the Ice Bowl to watch the sport of Curling and even got the chance to have a taster session and learn more about the sport.





















Roots of Empathy






